NEW FACES

Newly-Appointed Board Members

During the past year, we have added three new appointed members to our Board of Directors.

Karen Gionet Zentek, Archivist – In November 2019, Karen was appointed our first Archivist. Her role is to collect, preserve, and make accessible, the historical records held by the Cheshire Historical Society. Karen immediately took on the task of going through the official historical documents, personal diaries and journals, photographs, letters, scrapbooks, and unpublished books and cookbooks in the Hitchcock-Phillips House. It is also the Archivist's responsibility to explore the historical context in which the records were created, the uses for which they were intended, and their relationship to other sources. Karen's goal for 2021is to make our historical records accessible in both print (for those who visit in person) and digitized format that will be accessible in an online repository.

Eric Nelson, Assistant Curator for Native American Studies and Ethnobotany — In all honesty, Eric is not a new face to our visitors. In fact, he has pretty much been our resident "Rock Star" for many years, sharing his knowledge of native geology at many venues. He has a vast knowledge of local plant and animal life, is a frequent volunteer and guide for Cheshire Land Trust, and is a popular presenter for the Society's activities including CT Open House Day. While we wait to resume these inperson activities, Eric has been busy designing different types of engaging activities and managing our Native American Indian Exhibits.



Chris D'Agostino, Student Volunteer Curator – Chris started volunteering at the Hitchcock-Phillips House when he was a Senior at Xavier High School. He is currently a First Year Student at Albertus Magnus College, majoring in History, and continues to come to the House every Sunday to volunteer. He has already created a special exhibit in the second floor Panel Room containing about two dozen unusual objects from our collection.

RECENT HISTORY

A recap of events involving the Historical Society since the publication of our last Newsletter

Despite the closure of the Hitchcock-Phillips House to visitors for most of the past 12 months, and the cancellation of most of our traditional activities, the Board of Directors and volunteers have kept busy and productive.

- The "Boutique in the Shed" became a "Boutique on the Farm" fundraiser.
- We participated in the annual Independence Day Declaration Celebration with the Bennett Family and the Cheshire Horse Council, with a Post Rider bringing home letters from the front lines of the American Revolution (from the Beach History of Cheshire), which were read to attendees.

- **Karen Gionet Zentek** became our new webmaster and began redesigning our website. It remains a work in progress but is coming along nicely, with new tabs for easier reference.
- Volunteers and a contractor are refurbishing the Victorian Room. Renovations include removal of wallpaper, painting, floor improvements, and removal of glass display panels to allow better airflow and open up the covered radiator. Work is ongoing while we await the issuance of our Strategic Plan to identify our next steps with the room.
- Speaking of the Strategic Plan, Board Members and other interested parties attended three sessions led by consultant **Kathy Craughwell-Varda**, to formulate a true Strategic Plan for our organization. This involved identifying the Society's mission, vision, and aspirations, as well as core values, strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats. Throughout the process, we developed objectives, strategies, and operational tactics, as well as measurements and funding streams.
- **Zach Gottlieb** completed his Eagle Scout project, creating an Archive File Room/Office in the original apartment kitchen in the back of the building. (Photo at right)
- The Spirits Alive team created and posted on YouTube six Spirits Alive videos, to fill the
 void created by the lack of a live Tour this year. Many thanks to the Hall Family for their
 hard work on this.
- Pat Vita coordinated with the Town to install the stone Mile Marker XIII in the Lucille Williams Colonial Garden. This monument had marked 13 miles north of New Haven when it was in its original location across the street from Cheshire High School.
- Sunday volunteers, led by President **Diane Calabro**, brought the spirit of the holidays to the Hitchcock-Phillips House with several lit Christmas trees positioned in the windows facing the Green.
- Diane and **Lois Van Almkerk** spent many hours poring through donated scrapbooks. The registration of their contents is almost complete.
- José and Aida Rodriguez have spent many Sundays cataloguing the postcard collection donations from Attorney Bailey and Judge Voelker. While many of the postcards are duplicates of those already in our collection, they have also come across a few "gems."
- **Emily D'Souza** completed 70 hours of volunteer service for the Girl Scouts by performing an inventory of our extensive Decorative Arts book collection.
- We have also attempted to keep Cheshire's History Alive via social media (Facebook and Instagram) posts, including:
 - o "Quilty Pleasures" posts highlighting our quilt collection during National Quilt Month (March 2020);
 - o Today's Events are Tomorrow's History Signs of the Covid Times;
 - o The Independence Day Declaration Celebration;
 - A look at many of our tea sets and their significance for National Hot Tea Month this past January;
 - o The original Cheshire Country Club in West Cheshire for Black History Month; and
 - Occasional guest appearances by the History Hound.
